Daniels Scholarship Program

Information for **Applicants**

What is the Daniels Scholarship Program?

The Daniels Scholarship Program provides the opportunity for motivated students to earn a bachelor's degree that helps them build a successful life and career. Daniels Scholars demonstrate exceptional character, leadership, and a commitment to serving their communities. Bill Daniels would also want his scholars to be proud Americans who value our free enterprise system and are prepared to give the world their very best shot.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for the Daniels Scholarship Program, students must meet the following requirements at the time of application:

- Be a high school senior graduating from a school in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, or Wyoming
- Be a resident of Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, or Wyoming
- Be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States
- Earn a minimum Grade Point Average of 3.0 in high school (on an unweighted 4.0 scale), and earn a minimum SAT Math score of 490 and a minimum Evidence-Based Reading & Writing score of 490, or a minimum ACT score of 18 in each category (writing score not required). Super scoring is not accepted.*
 - * Students who were unable to take the SAT or ACT due to COVID-19 cancellations are eligible to apply with a minimum Grade Point Average of 3.3 in high school (on an unweighted 4.0 scale), and do not need to provide standardized test scores.
- Meet financial eligibility requirement (see "Am I financially eligible?" on the reverse side)

What are the selection criteria?

Daniels Scholars are selected because they embody the criteria Bill Daniels defined for the program:

- Strength of character
- Leadership potential
- Commitment to serving their communities
- Academic performance or promise
- Well-rounded personality
- Emotional maturity and stability

How do I apply?

Applying for the Daniels Scholarship Program will take time, and cannot be completed at the last minute. Students are encouraged to register, gather the documents they will need to apply, and identify a reliable recommender as early as possible.

The completed application — plus all required supporting documents and a recommendation — must be submitted by the deadline.

Eligibility Questionnaire | The Eligibility Questionnaire determines general and financial eligibility, and requires information from the 2019 tax return filed by the parent(s) or legal guardian(s) claiming the applicant as a dependent.

Recommendation | Applicants must obtain a recommendation from a high school representative (principal, teacher, guidance counselor, coach, etc.) who is 21 or older and not related to the applicant. Recommendations are confidential and must be submitted via the online application system. Recommenders receive instructions by email once the student identifies them on their application. An application without a recommendation will not be considered, so students must ensure the recommender meets the submission deadline.

Submit Application | Applications and recommendations must be completed and submitted online at **DanielsFund.org** by Sunday, November 15, 2020 at 4:00 PM MST. Late, mailed, faxed, or emailed submissions will not be accepted. Required documentation includes: parent(s) or legal guardian(s) 2019 tax return, official high school transcript, official ACT/SAT scores (if available), proof of citizenship and residency, and proof of college enrollment for any additional claimed dependent(s).

am I financially eligible?

In order to be eligible for the Daniels Scholarship Program, the applicant's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) must have an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) of \$85,000 or less on the 2019 tax return on which the applicant is a claimed as dependent (AGI appears on line 8b on the 2019 IRS Form 1040).

If there are additional dependents, beyond the applicant, claimed on this tax return, we allow for additional income as follows:

- \$5,000 for each additional dependent not in college
- \$15,000 for each additional dependent in college full-time during the 2020/21 academic year

The Eligibility Questionnaire determines general and financial eligibility, and requires information from the 2019 tax return filed by the parent(s) or legal guardian(s) claiming the applicant as a dependent. The Daniels Fund will ask applicants to upload a copy of their Student Aid Report (SAR) in December if more financial verification is necessary. The SAR is generated by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students should complete the FAFSA as soon as possible after it opens on October 1.

Where can I use the scholarship?

Daniels Scholars may attend any two or four-year, nonprofit, accredited college or university in the United States. Scholars must intend to complete a bachelor's degree, and those starting at a two-year college must be on a path to earning a bachelor's degree. Daniels Scholarships may not be used at technical or trade schools, or for participation in certificate programs.

What does the scholarship cover?

The Daniels Scholarship is a college scholarship that pays toward the costs of:

- Tuition and fees
- Books and supplies
- Room and board
- Miscellaneous educational expenses

The Daniels Scholarship Program provides a four-year college scholarship that is unique to each student and varies depending on their Expected Family Contribution (EFC) and their choice of school and degree program. The scholarship pays up to \$25,000 per year toward the student's unmet need, after applying their EFC, other scholarships, grants, and financial aid. The Daniels Scholarship may be used to attend any accredited college or university in the United States.

Daniels Scholarships are annually renewable up to a maximum of four academic years (8 semesters or 12 quarters) if scholars meet all requirements of the Daniels Scholarship Program.



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What are the benefits of the scholarship?

The Daniels Scholarship can cover most of the costs of earning a bachelor's degree, depending on factors such as the student's Expected Family Contribution (EFC), other scholarships, and financial aid, as well as their choice of school and degree program:

- Financial assistance toward a four-year undergraduate degree
- Dedicated help and support from Daniels Fund staff and designated on-campus contacts
- Recognition as a Daniels Scholar
- Campus communities with events, activities, and support exclusively for Daniels Scholars
- An alumni program offering ongoing support and a lifelong connection to a network of alumni and current scholars
- A new laptop computer

What's expected of Daniels Scholars?

- Meet all academic requirements while in college (including a minimum 2.0 GPA), and remain on track to graduate with a bachelor's degree within four academic years
- Live on campus during freshman year
- Work in a paid position during the academic year
 (5 hours/week first year and 10 hours/week every year after)
- Complete the Daniels Scholarship Enrichment Program, a series
 of online workshops led by topical experts on subjects such as
 patriotism, civics, free enterprise, entrepreneurship, leadership,
 critical thinking, etiquette, financial literacy, and earning an ethics
 certification
- Follow the Daniels Scholar Code of Conduct at all times
- Communicate regularly with their Scholar Relations Officer
- Fulfill all scholarship requirements and submit required documents by their deadlines
- Participate in the Daniels Fund's new scholar orientation conference held in June

Once I apply, what happens next?

Applications and recommendations must be submitted online through the Daniels Fund website by the deadline.

The Daniels Fund will ask applicants to upload a copy of their Student Aid Report (SAR) in December if more financial verification is necessary.



In January, all applicants will be notified whether or not they have been selected as a finalist. The next step for finalists is a virtual interview conducted by local community leaders in February or early March. The new class of Daniels Scholars is announced in late March.
